Start: 8.30am at Keele to catch mini-bus. This will be a linear walk and the mini-bus transport is important. **Please complete a booking form to attend**.

The main aim of the excursion is to walk up over the unique Millstone Grit topography of Skipton Moor characterized by small craggy whaleback ridges arranged en echelon and thought to represent a series of coarse sand-bodies in a succession of delta slope turbiditic siltstones and sandstones of the Pendle Grit Formation. Evidence of delta abandonment and emergence (The Bradley Coal) followed by marine submergence (the fossiliferous Cravenoceras cowlingense Marine Band) will also be seen.

This event highlights two important aspects of the Geology of Staffordshire:

- (a) the development and changing pattern of local geological environments during the Permo-Trias and Carboniferous Periods, and
- (b) the industrial application of local wealth in the form of rock materials.

Come and see the geology that made the local area an industrial powerhouse...image the changing environments from deltas to deserts...understand the nature of the local life (as fossils).

Main items:

- 1. Carboniferous to Trias simplified stratigraphic column with
 - illustrations and text on environments and their development (including paintings of past and present local environments)

Brown End Quarry trail launch

Saturday 22 May 2004 - Staffordshire Wildlife Trust launches new interpretive trail

Please come to the launch of SWT's new geological interpretive trail at Brown End Quarry at 11.00am.

Brown End Quarry is an important geological site in north Staffordshire. The site is designated as an SSSI and has been open to the public for many years. Over the last 12 months the Trust, NSGGA and others with a geological interest, have been working closely with consultant, John Macadam to redesign the visitor information at the reserve. The new facilities will include full colour interpretive panels, a new leaflet, education pack and outdoor seating for school visits.

To celebrate the completion of the project the Trust is holding an official opening of the site on 22 May 2004. Following the official opening at 11.00 visitors will be encouraged to participate in a variety of family activities – including fossil casting, creative arts and a geological quiz.

The project is funded by Aggregates Levy Sustainability Fund, Heritage Lottery Fund and Rural Regeneration north-east Staffordshire. Lafarge will fund the launch event.

Staffordshire Geodiversity Action Plan

The official launch, sponsored by Hanson Aggregates, of the Staffordshire Geodiversity Action Plan (SGAP) was well attended at a meeting held at the Staffs. Wildlife Trust Wolseley Centre headquarters on 22 March. Introduced by Paul Wilcox (SGAP Chairman), short speeches were given by Jonathan Larwood of English Nature, Guy Corbet-Marshall (SWT) and by the author Laura Cox.

Over the past months Laura has been collating the data she has accumulated from site visit assessment and the results can be viewed on the SGAP website at: www.sgeoap.org.uk

Unfortunately Laura's contract runs out at the end of March 2004. She is taking the opportunity to change to her married name of Laura Robinson, and to build upon her farming heritage by getting a herd of cattle to look after on the farm where she lives between Leek and Buxton.

Extractive Industries

Further to the report on concrete product manufacturer *Dale Crete* of Leekbrook seeking consent to work aggregate at Captain's Barn Farm near Weston Coyney (SJ949455), local residents have petitioned Staffs. County Council to refuse planning permission. The site is adjacent to Creswell Piece Wood, which is important for its trees and plant life, and is in a green belt area. Another major concern is the predicted 2 lorry loads an hour travelling to Leekbrook along the A522 on working days. The estimated output of the guarry is 75,000 tonnes a year for 16 years.

On 14 January 2004, the Leek Post & Times reported that Lafarge Cement at Waterhouses had applied for planning permission to extend their limestone and shale quarries, the products of which are used in making cement. A water feature may be created in areas where shale extraction has been completed. Waterhouses Parish Council approved the proposal.
